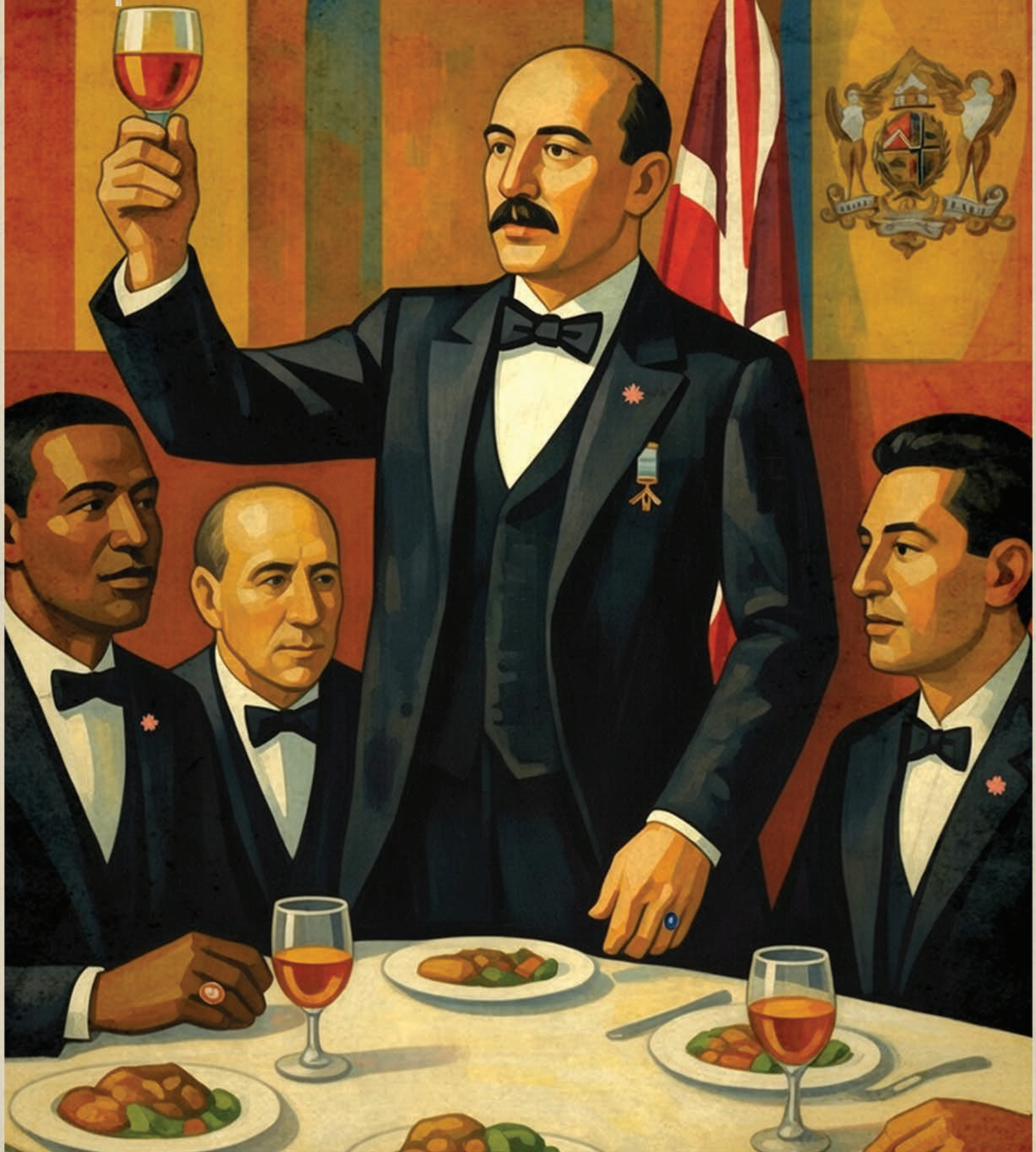

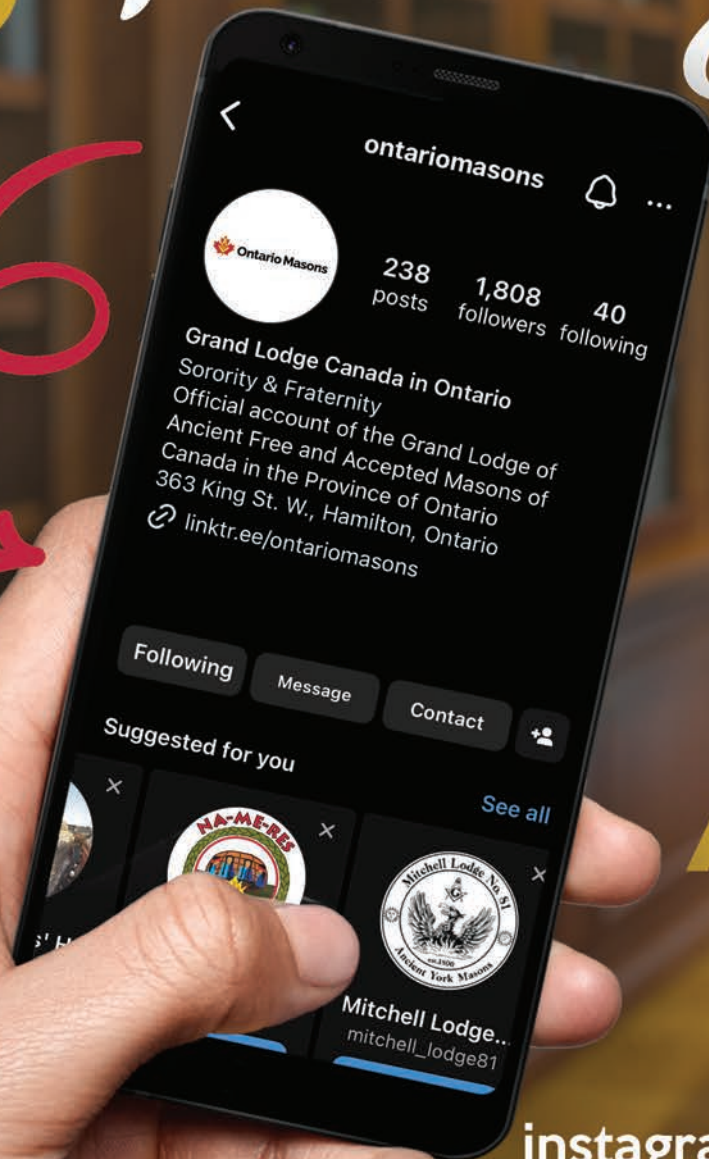

Grand Chaplain's Communique

It is still winter, as I look out onto my back yard. Days are only grudgingly getting a few minutes longer. Travel may be interrupted but allow me to focus on what we can control in our lodges.

Do we welcome our members and visitors? Ask their names. Where are they from? Is there a visitor, who ought to be seated in the east? Brought in with appropriate grand honours. Or as perhaps a courtesy? Brothers who may have absent for a time likely need not be reminded how long it has been. Rather, a handshake to remind them of the fellowship.

How does the Lodge room look? Are the collars being placed properly? The VOSL in place?

Is the Lodge prepared for any degree work? Are any necessary tools nearby in their appointed place? Have we worked on our ritual and floor work? What kind of time have we spent in preparation for this meeting?

Are all pieces assigned? A quick look around the ante room, before we tyle the lodge. Is every one here, who had agreed to take a part? If not, what are our options? On two occasions, when I was WM, two brethren stepped up to perform ritual with no notice.

Do we thank our brethren for doing work? Some find standing in front of lodge quite intimidating. Practice is the time to correct not during a presentation. Remember, but one prompter.

During the meeting, always remember to stand S and S, when addressing the WM. Such decorum will add solemnity to the meeting.

Perhaps my favourite time in Old Testament history takes place when the Lord brought His people back from Babylon to the land of Israel. The wall of Jerusalem was rebuilt in 52 days under Nehemiah.

But the people stopped and started to rebuild the temple. Energy and zeal were waning. Zerubbabel, the governor, gave leadership. He stepped up with a plumb line to continue the work. And the Lord was pleased he was working. He was making a start in a small way.

May we do the same and continue with our Masonic work and perhaps to start something new.

Deputy Grand Master's Communique

Greetings Brethren,

In the previous communique, we began our focus on what we termed the hard skills we strive to master as we progress through an officer line. These would include our presentation of the ritual in the spoken word, the mechanics associated with our role in the ritual, and the protocols expected in our carriage and in our example. As the interest in our Officer Progression program continues to grow, it presented a need to review what would be required to master over time, the soft skills associated with our development as leaders. Thus, our reintroduction of the Leadership Development Committee.

In every organization it is important to have a strong, structured leadership team. This structure would include a capable leader to establish the organization's mission and vision, supported by a solid management structure. The primary role of the management team is to ensure that tasks are completed, and that goals are met according to the leader's vision.

The distinction between Leadership and Management is that they both have different meanings and they should not be used interchangeably. Both imply a unique set of skills, characteristics and functions. In the setting and executing a company's vision and aspirations, leaders and managers have different roles. Leaders convey the organization's mission, goals and vision to the entire organization. Managers act in the present by reviewing, developing and implementing effective processes to move the vision forward.

When it comes to an organizational culture, effective leaders can influence the outlook and behaviour of their members and successfully communicate the desired culture throughout their organization. Managers in turn lead their departments or committees to live up to the culture shaped by the leadership. The success of this approach will solely depend on a strong collaboration between management and leadership. This can only be achieved with open and transparent

communication between leadership, management and the members.

The success and harmony of any organization depend on effective leadership to establish its mission, and good managers to ensure that tasks are successfully achieved in reaching the goals outlined by the company's vision. In short, leaders set the goals, managers follow it, leaders form the culture, managers support it and move it forward through their respective departments and committees.

Under the leadership of R.W. Bro. Maher Eid, our Leadership Development Committee has the mandate to ascertain various forms of leadership, and to determine which leadership model would most effectively align with our organization and jurisdiction. In doing so, the object is to identify those soft skills which we inadvertently develop over time as we progress through our various roles within the Craft. To this end the committee has developed a very comprehensive presentation which to date has been well received at two seminar sessions and, is currently scheduled to present on January 31st for the York and surrounding districts, and on March 28, for districts surrounding the GTA.

Lodge Meeting Dates and Times in Grand View

Secretaries and Assistant Secretaries are temporarily able to update lodge meeting dates and times in Grand View. Lodges should plan to review and make any adjustments as early in February as possible before this is once again locked down.

Secretaries and Assistant Secretaries are temporarily able to update the physical address of the lodge building and will be able to update the lodge mailing address at any time.

In addition to providing you with valuable access, it will keep you informed, including with regards to electronic voting.

The Secretary must ensure email addresses are assigned to these officers in Grand View so they can login, and the Secretary must keep all officers up to date to ensure access and electronic voting rights.

Celebrating A Lifetime Of Dedication & Fidelity:

HONORING V.W. BRO. ROBERT 'BOB' MCTAVISH

Few milestones in Masonry are as rare and memorable as a 70-years of service award as a Mason, and fewer still are matched by the inspiration of receiving 60- years as a Past Master service recognition. Rarer still is when such distinction is accompanied by clarity of memory, warmth of spirit, and continued engagement in the life of the Craft, so fittingly embodied by V.W. Bro. Robert "Bob" L. McTavish.

Initiated at just 23 years of age in 1952, Bob was installed as Worshipful Master of Stanely Lodge in 1962 and 1969, (which amalgamated with Victoria Lodge #474), marked 70 years as a Mason in December 2022 and reached another rare distinction in December 2025, 60 years as a Past Master.

Now 94 years young, he remains sharp, articulate, and fully engaged with the Craft, faithfully reading the Ontario Mason Magazine, Lodge summonses, and keeping abreast of Masonic life across Ontario.

Bob's recollections form a living archive of Ontario Masonry: Toronto Districts with 37 Lodges, installations and Lodge visitations almost nightly, and his reception as Worshipful Master in 1962 held at his home with 65 Masons present following his Installation.

And above all, Bob is a family man, father to Roger, Judy, and Paul, grandfather to seven, and great-grandfather to three: a living testament to continuity, commitment, and the enduring spirit of Masonry across generations.

78 YEARS

**DEDICATED TO THE
SERVICE OF FREEMASONRY**
A TRIBUTE TO BRO. LEIGHTON RONSON

One hundred years ago, the Town of Tillsonburg marked its centennial, life in the community carried a simple, hopeful rhythm. People searched the countryside for a large snapping turtle, and on December 30, 1925, Glenwood Leighton Ronson was born. Growing up on Broadway Street in Tillsonburg, his childhood must have felt close to idyllic. Days were filled with fishing, frogging, and floating on nearby Lake Lisgar, with countless hours spent chasing tadpoles and searching for turtles—simple joys that shape a young heart and leave lifelong memories.

That peaceful rhythm was inevitably broken when war was declared against Nazi Germany. Like so many young men and women of his generation, Leighton answered the call to serve King and Country. He enlisted in the Royal Canadian Signal Corps in 1943 at the age of 18, serving in Great Britain and France during the final two years of the Second World War. After the war's end, he remained in Germany for a year, helping to restore the nation's communications infrastructure—a quiet but vital contribution to rebuilding a shattered world.

Upon returning home to Tillsonburg, Leighton, like many returning veterans, sought to preserve the sense of brotherhood and shared purpose forged during his service. He joined the Royal Canadian Legion, continuing that bond of camaraderie.

Yet many veterans also searched for something deeper—hope, meaning, and a renewed faith in humanity after witnessing the immense suffering mankind can inflict upon itself.

For many, including Leighton, that solace was found in Freemasonry. During this time, membership in the Grand Lodge of Canada in the Province of Ontario rose to unprecedented heights.

Leighton Ronson was initiated into King Hiram Lodge No. 78 on May 21, 1947, alongside two other brethren. Such was the demand for initiation that the lodge held three meetings in a single week to welcome all who sought entry. Within the Craft, Leighton found fellowship without conditions. Background, status, or circumstance did not matter. He found friendship—true friends he could rely upon for support in times of difficulty—and a circle of like-minded men guided by Faith, Hope, Charity, and the enduring wisdom of the Golden Rule.

Family Life of our Grand Masters

BY V.W. BRO. MARSHALL KERN PAST GRAND HISTORIAN

All but two of our Grand Masters were married during their lives. M.W. Bro. Alexander Stevenson and M.W. Bro. John Albert Dobbie remained life-long bachelors.

Several Past Grand Masters suffered the loss of a wife, some of these men re-married. There are three Past Grand Masters who experienced such loss and re-marriage several times.

M.W. Bro. William Mercer Wilson was married three times. In the autumn of 1834 he brought his wife, Jane Brown, to Simcoe. For 15 years she remained at his side: she died in 1849. William then married Susan Grace Codner of Devonshire, England. Misfortune again overtook him with her death in 1857. Late in life, M.W. Bro. Wilson and his third wife, Mary Elizabeth Cronyn, a prominent London widow, made their home on Norfolk Street South in Simcoe the social centre of the community.

M.W. Bro. James P. Maher was married three times. His first marriage lasted 10 years and ended with the death of his wife. His second marriage lasted 18 years, until his second wife died. His third marriage lasted six years, until M.W. Bro. Maher died. His last wife outlived him by 18 years.

M.W. Bro. John M. Gibson was married three times. On October 26, 1869, he married Anne Emily, daughter of Ralph Birrell, a merchant of London, Ontario. She died on June 3, 1874. Two years later, on September 26, he married Caroline, daughter of Honourable Adam Hope of Hamilton. One year later she too died. In 1891, he took as his third wife, Eliza, daughter of Judge Malloch of Brockville.

These stories of remarriage should help us understand the significant place of family in the lives of these men. It should be clear that they made time to care for their wives.

THE ALCHEMIST'S COMPASS:

BEING A MASON IN THE DIGITAL AGE

Our experience of the world is interconnected. Boundaries between physical and digital lives continually blur and get thinner, the wisdom of ancient traditions often feels distant. We swipe, scroll, and click through our days, frequently without pausing to consider the deeper currents at play.

Carl Gustav Jung, a titan in the field of psychology, spent years delving into ancient alchemical manuscripts. What he discovered was truly groundbreaking. Jung proposed that the alchemists' centuries-long quest to transform "base metals" into gleaming gold was not primarily a chemical endeavor. Instead, he argued, it was a symbolic blueprint, a profound allegory for a deeply personal, psychological evolution—a process he termed individuation.

This was described as "the process by which individual beings are formed and differentiated; in particular, it is the development of the psychological individual as a being distinct from the general, collective psychology" (Jung, *Collected Works*, Vol. 6, para. 757). It's the primordial drive towards self-realization, the unfolding of one's full, intrinsic potential, much like an acorn is driven to become an oak tree.



There are recurring motifs in myths, fairy tales, and dreams across all cultures, and some key archetypes play a pivotal role in the individuation process. Freemasonry, often subjected to far too much speculative interpretations, conceals underneath the surface of this cauldron of opinions an important truth: the recognition of our continuous battle between the persona and the shadow. The understanding that our imperfections are as much a part of us as our perfections.

Each degree is consistently providing a unifying direction that harmonizes all seemingly opposing forces within the individual, leading to an increased sense of inner coherence and meaning. It's crucial to understand that individuation, despite its emphasis on the individual, is not about ego's trap or isolation of the Self. Quite the opposite, Jung strongly emphasized that "the process of individuation must lead to more intense and broader collective relationships and not to isolation" (Jung, *Collected Works*, Vol. 6, para. 758). By becoming more whole and authentic, by truly knowing who we are, we paradoxically become more capable of genuinely relating to others, fostering deeper

connections, and contributing more meaningfully to the community.

Now, let's bring this ancient wisdom into our contemporary landscape: how do we feel connected into our modern world and era? In the "laboratory" of our masonic Craft we are somehow far from the intricate digital realm, while in everyday life we are constantly immersed in a storm of information, meticulously curated digital personas, and an almost inescapable current of comparisons. These inputs can feel like the "base metals" of our digital existence—overwhelming, fragmented, and toxic at times to our well-being. The monumental challenge for us today is to navigate this digital landscape without losing our authentic selves and figure out how to transmute these "digital base metals" into our own personal gold.

Consider for a moment how the very nature of digital interactions can inadvertently trigger a false sense of integration or even exclusivity but also initiate this ancient alchemical process within us. The constant exposure to idealized, often unrealistic, lives can easily make us feel inadequate, envious, or even dissatisfied when compared to the polished online facades. However, it would be an oversimplification to view the digital media solely as a source of psychological "burden", while in fact (paradoxically) they offer an unprecedented opportunity for self-discovery and transformation, acting as a powerful, albeit complex, an alchemist's furnace. The true art maybe lies in learning to consciously harness these digital tools to foster our own individuation process, rather than letting them overwhelm us. Same as in Jung's work, it's about confronting your digital shadow.

Do you find yourself prone to impulsivity when commenting online? Are there specific aspects of your online persona that feel inauthentic, driven by a need for external validation rather than genuine expression? Without digging into the amorous

intercourse between Science and Philosophy, where ontology and neurobiology yet attempt to describe the state of consciousness and human determinism, my suggestion is rather pragmatic and perhaps stoic: focus on what you can effectively control and aim to be the best version of yourself.

Quite often we find ourselves, at lodge (and even more outside the temple), dealing with similar dilemmas, acting and debating on the very same content that disrupts the reputation of our very own Craft. Just like in real life, the first crucial step in this digital landscape is awareness:

observation without judgement, mindful digital consumption, and clear real-life application of our masonic principles.

These can all be the ingredients of a perfect nutrition diet. It's important to be aware of all these technological tools, but even more to understand how technology can be our trusted ally. The digital world can be a powerful bridge towards enlightenment: so be fiercely intentional about the content you consume and fully aware of the way you portray yourself as a mason.

Finally, consider the transformative power of digital detoxes. Any continuative repetition can

be detrimental to our own mental and physical balance. Implementing specific times or days for a complete digital disconnection—a "digital sabbath" perhaps—it's nowadays necessary; it provides a crucial space for introspection, allowing the insights gained during the online engagement to truly integrate into our psyche; it allows for the vital synthesis of our conscious and unconscious worlds to unify into the path of individuation which - much like the alchemist's legendary Great Work - it's not a finite project with a definitive endpoint but a life-long craft to master.

I would first like to express how honoured I am that I will hopefully pass to the second degree tonight. That being said, there are certain individuals I would like to express my gratitude. 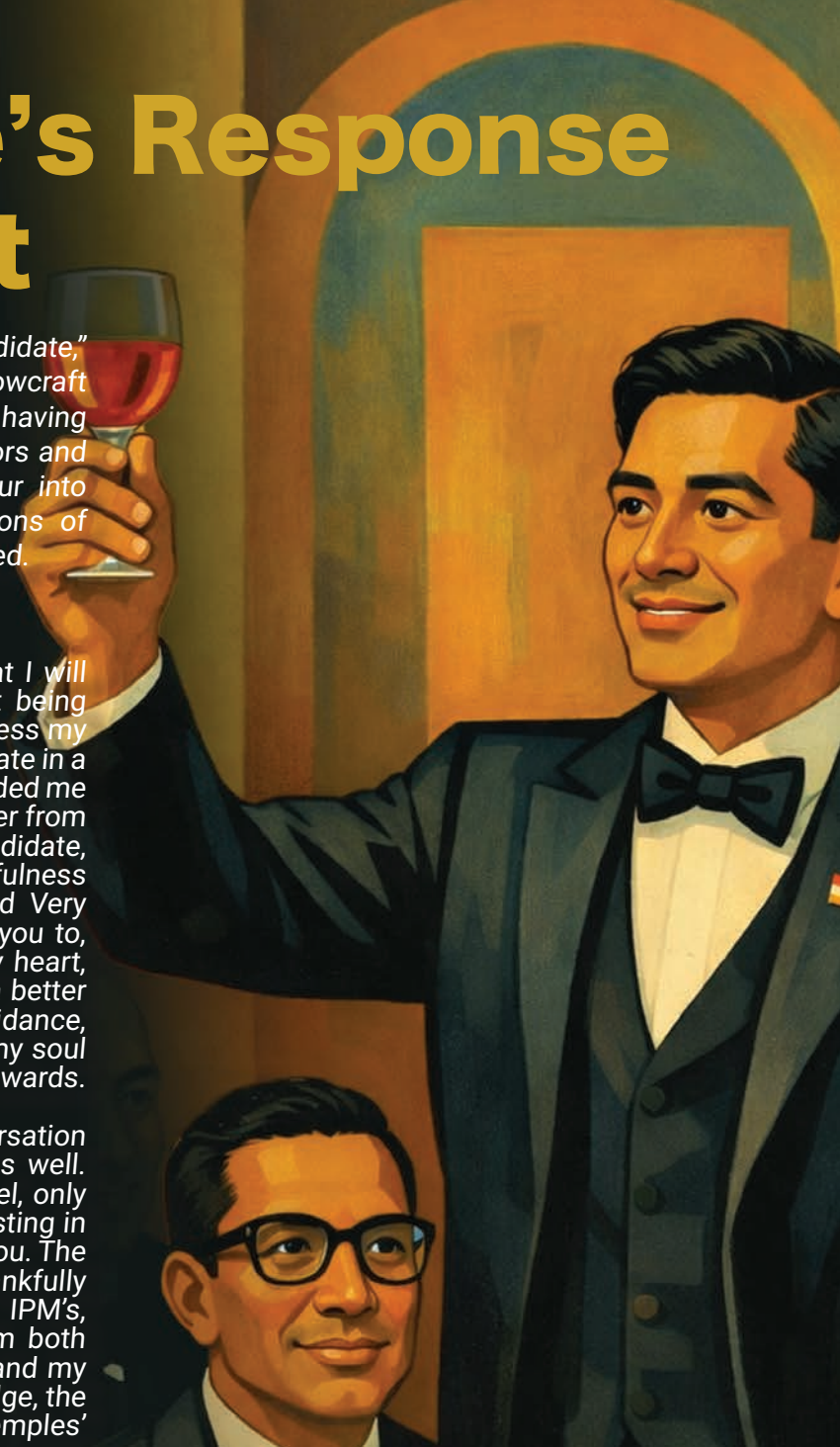

THE KINDNESS WE CARRY

A CHOICE FOR LEADERS

Leadership sets the tone in every institution. The way we treat each other while getting things done is the clearest demonstration of what we truly believe.

In a memorable commencement address, author George Saunders shared a truth he called “a little corny” but undeniable: *“What I regret most in my life are failures of kindness.”* This reflection cuts to the core of our professional lives, especially for those in leadership.

Leaders make tough choices daily that impact other humans. In doing so, they consciously or unconsciously choose where to stand on a continuum between kindness and cruelty.

While our readers understand cruelty, it’s vital to recognize its specific, harmful patterns in the workplace: intentional actions - from verbal bullying and professional sabotage to social ostracism and discriminatory practices - that cause psychological or physical harm. These behaviours create severe human and organizational costs, including burnout, turnover, and a profound erosion of trust.

Yet, while cruelty depletes us, kindness completes us.

This isn’t a weak or mushy notion. As Saunders suggests, the moments that haunt us are often failures of kindness, while the people we remember most fondly are those who were kindest to us. The irony is that kindness, often seen as soft, is also the robust, long-term choice for our self-interest. Cruelty, unless we are unwell, tends to haunt the perpetrator. Kindness heals everyone it touches.

The workplace is a daily proving ground for this choice. We understand the difficulty of hard decisions and the human frailty that invites cruelty when we hold power. Still, it remains a choice.

The most effective leaders hurry along the process of becoming kinder, starting now.

South Station Chili

INGREDIENTS:

4 Tbsp oil
4-5 pounds lean ground beef
2 large onions, chopped
3 - 16 oz cans of kidney beans, rinsed and drained
2 - small cans black beans
3 Large cans diced tomatoes
1 L beef broth
3-4 Tbsp chili powder
2 Tbsp ground coriander
2 Tbsp ground cumin
5 garlic cloves, minced
2 Tsp oregano; Salt to taste near end.

DIRECTIONS:

In a large pot, heat 2 Tbsp oil over medium heat, add the beef and brown (not pink). Drain excess fat and set meat aside. In same pot, add onions to remaining oil and cook until tender. Add meat back to pot, along with garlic, chili powder, coriander and cumin - stir well to blend flavours, managing low to medium heat for 7-10 mins. Add the remaining ingredients and let come to a slow boil. Reduce heat and simmer; keep covered, stirring occasionally for about 1 hour. Adjust for salt, and spiciness. Serve with a variety of breads, corn/tortilla chips/salad.

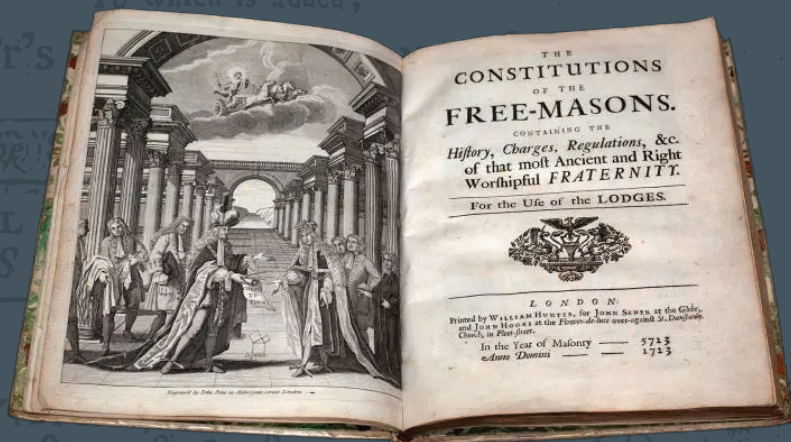

TOP WEBSITE AWARD

District & Lodge

The Communications Pillar Chairman has tasked the website review committee this year with developing a best practice guide with regards to both district and lodge websites. It is felt that by incorporating as many of these as possible into your district's website, it will only enhance the experience of those visiting your district and lodge websites.

The following was recently approved by the Board of General Purposes.

1. Fonts should be good size to make it easy to read
2. Incorporate colour.
3. Use secure website (HTTPS vs HTTP)
4. Website must be kept up-to-date
5. Special events listed to attract visitors to the lodges
6. Links to others sites should checked regularly to make sure they are still active
7. Use of Grand Lodge branding is a must
8. Member data should be restricted to comply with privacy act
9. Use of multi-media is encouraged
10. Menu driven sites, avoid long scrolling pages.
11. Include contact info – use of generic email addresses is encouraged

The Grand Master, M.W. Bro. Jamie Ireland, had also asked us to review the method in which we evaluate the websites. At the annual communication this year, there will be an award presented to the top district website and the top lodge website. To this end, we came up with several categories with a numeric range for judging them.

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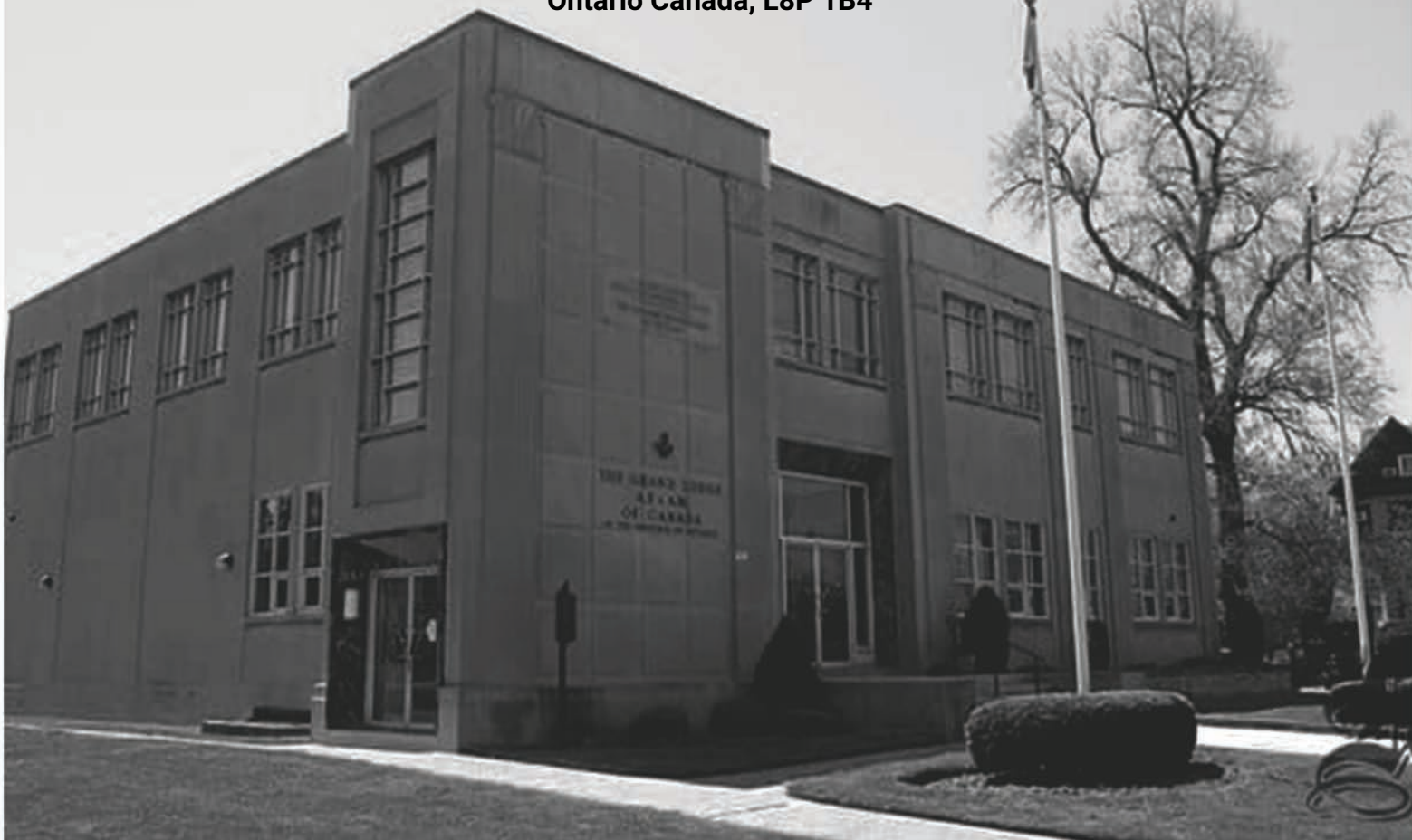
