

The Mason and the Algorithm: A Thunderous Reflection on the Discipline of Questioning

He must carve his understanding upon the pillars of Truth, not upon the shifting sands of digital vanity. The algorithm may feed the intellect, but only questioning nourishes the soul.

Thus, brethren, let us renew our vow at the altar of discernment: to think, to test, to doubt, and to seek. For in the sacred act of questioning lies the eternal Light that no machine can manufacture, and no ego can eclipse.
